The assistant district attorneys for St. Bernard Parish's 34th judicial district back up enforcement agents with great knowledge of wildlife laws and strong prosecution skills.

Those agents issuing citations in the St. Bernard Parish court system are well acquainted with the three assistant D.A.'s, with whom they work closely to gain convictions of wildlife law violators, including those involved in boating accident and DWI-related cases. The prosecutors' knowledge of wildlife laws has increased through the years, as they have focused considerable effort in communicating with enforcement agents on these cases.

individuals whom they meet as a result of their chosen profession. In addition to wildlife violators, the prosecutors also must deal with drug offenders, subjects involved in domestic dispute cases and shoplifters, just to name a few.
